e Preschool Expansion Grants

(RTT-ELC) discretionary grant program supports states in support state building statewide systems that raise the quality of Early Learning and Development Programs and increase access to high-quality programs, and programs for children with high needs, so that all children enter kindergarten ready to succeed.

Grants awarded to States: Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Vermont Preschool Development Grants support states to build or enhance their infrastructure to provide high-quality preschool programs, and expand high-quality preschool programs in high-need communities.

Grants awarded to States: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Vermont Early Head Start - Child Care Expansion and Partnership Grabts

These competitive grants allow Early Head Start grantees to partner with center-based and family child care providers who agree to meet Early Head Start Performance Standards and provide comprehensive, full-day, full-year high-quality services to infants and toddlers.


